

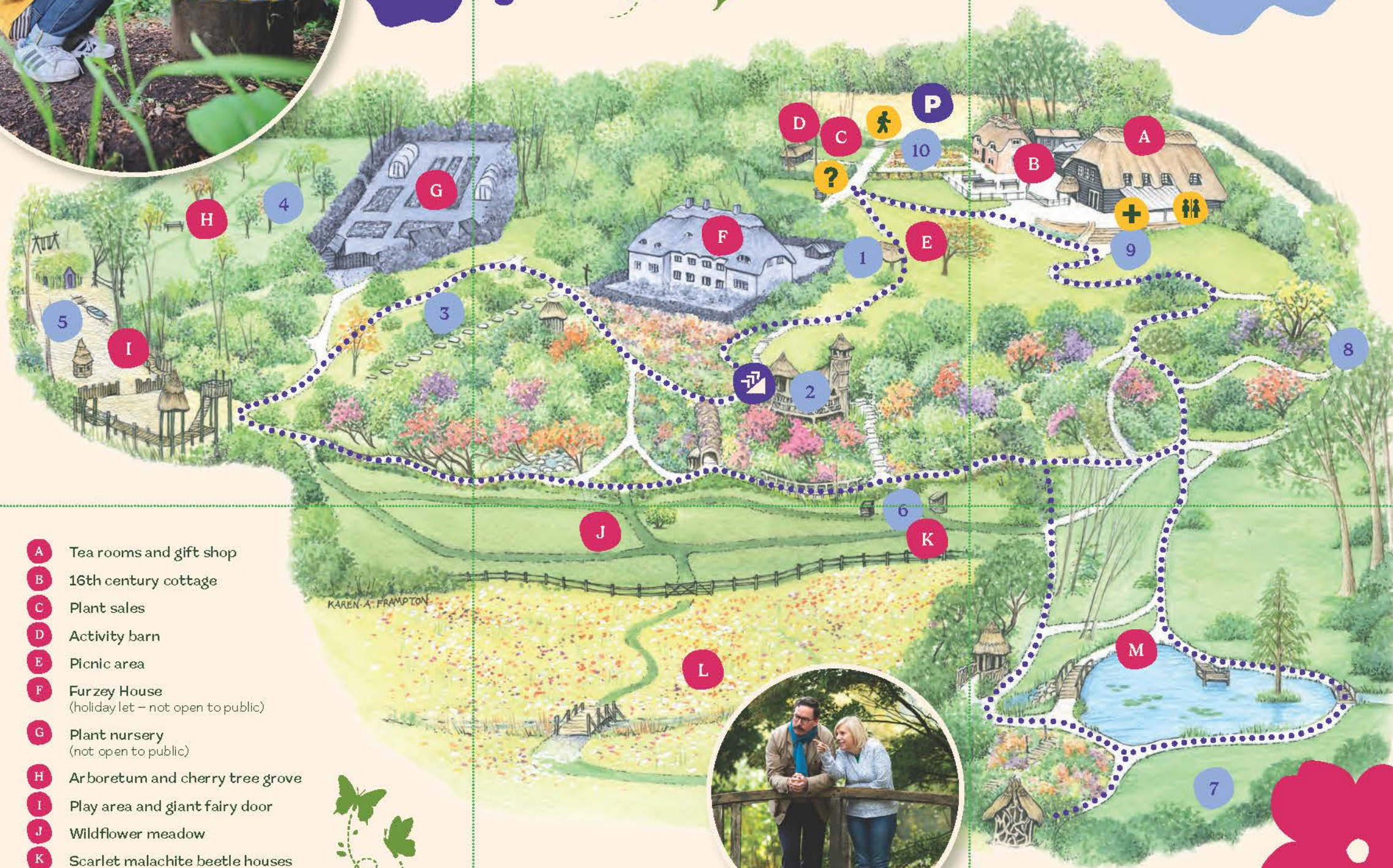
Discover tiny fairy doors
